off to the outside edge. The top and bottom surfaces of an H column or I beam are not parallel, but slightly curved.

The slight bulges will not be noticecompleted structures as much as when examining individual pieces. Use of matte paint finishes would be preferable to gloss for this reason.

The side and ends come prepainted and lettered on a single sheet of scribed siding and must be cut to size, following silkscreened guidelines. The underframe, fascia, roof walk and trim require building up with stripwood (supplied). The queen posts and brake wheel are cast brass; the K brake is a soft metal casting. End steps and grab irons come preformed by the manufacturer. Cast plastic nut-boltwasher castings are furnished. Brass wire is provided for truss rods, piping, and brake rodding. No trucks nor couplers are provided.

No difficulties were encountered with the construction. All pieces fitted as described in the instructions. The stripwood materials are color-coded for easy identification.

The finished model is first rate. Matching Floquil paint is required for the roof, ends, and for touching up.

Price is \$3.95 Canadian currency, postpaid. This is about \$3.65 in U.S. money, but there is a 15 percent duty to U.S. purchasers which must be paid - sometimes to the postman or post office, or to a customs office - on receipt of the package. When ordering, use an international money order (available at banks). The kits are also available from some S scale suppliers in the U.S.
